Nakleng: a cultural history of Thai masculinities (1948-1960)





นู้หมู่นักเบ่งถือระเบิดมือเข้าไปอาถวาดในบาร์กถางก็ก *Nakleng* are traditional, rural gang leaders and Robin Hood-style figures first identified in pre-modern Siam. The modern form of this masculine figure continues to be re-interpreted and represented in Thai popular culture from the Post-Second World War up until the โคอ. บุกยิงรตอ. บุนสถานีตำรวจ ๓ นัดซ้อน present. Scholarly works on Thai masculinity frequently refer to nakleng as the most significant representative of Thai masculinity. Nakleng are portrayed as the dominant masculine form in Raewyn Connell's model of "hegemonic masculinity" in a Thai context. Wanchana's work challenges the broad application of this famous framework in the analysis of nakleng. In this talk, his argument is presented in accordance with the cultural history of nakleng in the dynamic of plural and antagonistic masculine forms in Thai popular culture during 1948-1960. The case study of nakleng in the context <mark>ฯแก้ปัญหาวัยรุ่น</mark> of the modern Thai police under the lead of Pol.Gen.Phao Sriyanon and the paternalistic government of Field Marshall Sarit Thanarat substantiates the complexity and everchanging masculinities to the extent that Connell's model is inadequate for analysis.
